It would be boring. Maybe that's why all the stories that are worth saying have a problem. Most scholars agree that there are six fundamental types of conflicts in literature. I will define each of these resources to help your students to master the concept of conflict in literature. In this type of conflict, the central character clashes with another person. You don't always have a person. You don't always have a person instead of entity. Not all conflicts are among the characters. Jimmy and Eric compete for the same position on the baseball team. When a story has a person against the conflict of sà ©, the main character fights him or herself. He or she may have to make a difficult choice. Or he or she may have to face a personal problem. The key here is that the battle occurs within the character, even if it can lead to and influence other characters. Alexa caught her friend of her Jamie stealing from a classmate. Now Alexa must choose between keeping her friendship with Jamie and doing the right thing. With this type of conflict, the main character or characters can fight against the forces representing these institutions. Vanessa makes an art project protesting the police's brutality. Her art teacher of her loves the project and tries to present it in the artistic show of the city, but the county commission refuses the project. Vanessa, his art teacher fought for freedom of expression. When a story has a person against the conflict of nature, the main character fights to endure or overcome the forces of nature. He or she can fight to survive hard elements, browse through a disaster or meet her basic needs. Stories with this type of conflict can often occur in the desert, but can also occur in the desert also occ to the shore.
